Pastoral Perspective



Concerning the teachings of Jesus—Jesus made one point over and over again most emphatically—the things He declared and taught were not in any way opposed to the ancient beliefs and teachings of Israel. It was the religious authorities of His time that had fallen into error, not Jesus. Jesus, Elijah, Moses, Abraham

and the other prophets and leaders of ancient Israel were in harmony. The so-called interpreters of Scripture who had come between had gradually lost touch with the real meaning of Scripture and had come to believe that their opinions were the sacred Word of God.

So, repeatedly, Jesus found Himself debating Scriptural matters with one authority or another, invariably revealing the falsehoods or contradictions of their teachings in the simplest and most inarguable way possible by using the Scriptures themselves to back up His own statements. He knew the Scriptures better than anyone else which must have really riled His opponents. And there was nothing they could do with Him. In every debate, those who accused Jesus of misusing Scripture walked away being shown as ones who themselves misused Scripture.

But in a delightful passage from Mark's gospel we read of a scribe who saw things clearly:

12:28 And one of the scribes came up and heard them disputing with one another, and seeing that he answered them well, asked him, "Which commandment is the most important of all?" **29** Jesus answered, "The most important is, 'Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one. **30** And you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength.' **31** The second is this: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' There is no other commandment greater than these." **32** And the scribe said to him, "You are right, Teacher. You have truly said that he is one, and there is no other besides him. **33** And to love him with all the heart and with all the understanding and with all the strength, and to love one's neighbor as oneself, is much more than all whole burnt offerings and sacrifices." **34** And when Jesus saw that he answered wisely, he said to him, "You are not far from the kingdom of God."

Here was a scribe of the old true school. Here was one who had not been sucked in by the politicking, greed and arrogance of most all of the religious authorities. The Temple had been turned into a marketplace and undo emphasis had been placed upon burnt sacrifices for the simple reasons that there was money in it and it gave the religious authorities a means of exerting power over the people. It's good to read about a scribe who wasn't caught up in this.

A mutual endorsement came out of this encounter between Jesus and the scribe. The

scribe approved of Jesus and Jesus approved of the scribe. This is highly significant for it gives evidence of what we have already said—that Jesus was perfectly in tune with the Scriptures. Jesus really was in the spirit of Israel. A person could be a follower of Jesus and stay true to his heritage because Jesus was the past of Israel come alive in the present to fulfill the promise of the heritage.

Jesus and the scribe stood solidly together on two important points. First, they agreed that God is one. Second, they agreed that the love of God and persons is the essential activity of the disciple. These teachings had remained the same all along, and still do. These are the greatest and most ancient teachings of Israel. In Jesus, these teachings came alive. We are united with the one God through Him and His love flows through us to unite us all in God's love. The scribe was very close to realizing this. May we all realize it and have life in our loving Lord.

Kitchen Committee – as reported last month this committee has been hard at work in selecting and purchasing Kitchen Appliances as listed on the

#3 Priority Blumhardt Priority List.

The first item purchased was 1 HP Disposal to replace the residential disposal in the sink adjacent to the dishwasher. The residential disposal will be re-installed in one of the lesser used sinks.

If you haven't been in the kitchen to see the absolutely beautiful commercial refrigerator please be sure and take time to go see it. By the time you read this the new Kitchen Aid 36 in. stove top should be installed as well as the hood and ice maker machine.

For those of us who have done any cooking or food preparation for the crab feed and many other events it is hard to explain how blessed we feel to have been given an opportunity to update our kitchen in such a miraculous way.

The WELCA Kitchen committee has decided to award the selection of the hot water heater to the knowledgeable Property Board and thank them for all their support with the selection and installation of the other appliances.

On-Going Projects:

1. **AC Security Fences** – The fences are completed, but one additional bar will be added on the top-back to close a gap.

2. **Windows/Deteriorated Boards Replacement** – This project received the “final” inspection and approval from the City on June 28. Bruce Kiser and the skilled worker have painted the new stucco on the south end (lower portion) and will complete the remaining painting, as they are available.

3. **ADA Toilet Room** – This Priority 2 Blumhardt project is underway and is approximately 75% completed. The Building Permit was received on June 24; the underground work has been approved; and the rough framing, plumbing and electrical will be inspected tomorrow (July 6). *P.S The inspections passed.*

Additional Yard Lights:

SMUD Fixtures – At the March Council meeting, the Board received approval to install two SMUD yard lights on the power poles along the north property line. Since then, Clarence Korhonen has received lighting diagrams from SMUD and the Board has laid out (on the ground) the lighting resulting from such lights. The cost is about \$23/month per light for a required five-year lease (approximately \$550 for two lights per year).

Recommendation: Do not install the SMUD yard lights because of the fixed annual costs and lack of lighting effectiveness. Instead, install suitable new lights at the (i) east end of the Multi-Purpose Room, (ii) north side of the Multi-Purpose Room and (iii) north side of the Schultz Hall new addition. Approximate cost is \$500; fund with moneys from the Property Board Special Funds sub-account. **(Council Approval Requested)**

East End Education Wing – The Board will move the 400-watt light fixture by the secondary Office door to the east end of the Education Wing and replace the Office door light by smaller new light fixture. The fixture has been received.

Altar Guild Room Sink/Faucet: This work was approved at the June’s Council meeting and is to be funded by the remaining 2011 Crab Feed moneys. A revised bid has been requested, which includes moving the Altar Guild Room water heater to the Janitor’s Room, but has not been received to date.

Kitchen Hot Water Heater: Priority 3 Blumhardt Project: In support of the WELCA “Kitchen Committee” who is also investigating water heaters and obtaining bids this Board has requested Johnston Plumbing, the ADA Toilet Room plumber, to provide bids for two, gas commercial water heaters that will fit in the available space – one, a 80 percent efficient heater that requires a new roof vent; the other, a 95 percent efficient heater that would not require a new roof vent.

Courtyard Repairs/Replacement: Eric Linblade will discuss the courtyard repairs with appropriate contractors and attempt to obtain quotes (a) to repair the flagstone joints and low areas and (b) to replace completely the flagstone courtyard. Previously, Bruce Kiser obtained a \$12,000 bid to replace the flagstone with stamped concrete.

Work Day August 13—Potential Projects:

1. Sprinklers – check and adjust time.
2. Trash – pick up throughout yard areas and bushes.
3. Storm Drain (at NE corner of new addition) – remove grate and clean outlet and pipes.
4. Added Exterior Office Light – replace fixture.
5. Dead Tree (NE corner of park) – cut/remove tall weeds around the tree and in the corner.
6. Planter Areas – clean and spruce up areas.
7. **Please come** –if there is nothing on this list that you are interested in doing we have many more badly needed projects, some of which do not require strenuous labor. If you are unable to come, look for a list in the Narthex that can be done at your convenience.

Then there were those who gave refreshments or made other donations. Many different efforts go into making this event a success every year. Without all of you, it couldn't be done. To celebrate the Bible's many heroes, make this sandwich for a picnic.

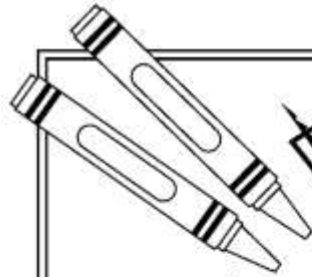
What you need:
