Pastoral Perspective



"You shall love the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the great and first commandment. And the second is like it; You shall love your neighbor as yourself." Matthew 22:37-39

Jesus, here, is teaching that loving God and neighbor is of the utmost importance for you as you

follow Jesus in your day to day life. How are you to love God? By loving your neighbor. In what way are to love your neighbor? Love them as you love yourself. If you love others as you love yourself, then you are loving God. All the Law and the Prophets are distilled into this single principle. This one precept replaces the amazing detailed patchwork of the Mosaic code and covers infinitely more territory.

"Love your neighbor as yourself", Jesus said. It is the "as yourself" that is the operative element here. It is the element that you can't get around. It is the "as yourself" that makes this commandment comprehensive, universally applicable and without loopholes.

What does "as yourself" really mean? In what way do you love yourself that you should extend this love to others? Unless you suffer from severe depression or some other disorder, you love yourself in the sense that, even though you know you are not flawless, you are dear to yourself. You ask God to protect, provide for and preserve you. You are on the lookout for people who will affirm your value as a person. You love yourself in the sense that anything connected with you seems vitally important. You need not have any illusions that you are the perfect person. You need not have any false affection for yourself. But, In spite of your shortcomings, your watch out for

yourself. As for your faults, you are always hoping they will be excused by others. You feel that for any trouble you may cause, you are still somehow worthwhile. In spite of everything, you believe that there is a God given good to you that can and should be saved. When you are surrounded by people who are able to see this good and are concentrating on bringing it out, you are a vastly more joyful and better person for it.

Jesus taught that if you turn this kind of attention on others, it is love. You don't need to try to force yourself to feel false affection toward others. You don't need to try to make yourself blind to those qualities that are less than ideal about them. And you certainly don't have to always be giving others just what they want. You are, rather, to love others as you love yourself. That means you are to see their needs as vitally important. You are to see them as sharers in God's gifts rather than competitors and so share freely with them. You are to pray for the best in them even when knowing the worst.

Now you can get yourself in real trouble if you try to do this on your own power. You can use others simply to make yourself feel better about yourself or to fulfill your own desires. It is important to share this love as you have received it from Jesus—humbly, graciously, seeing yourself simply as a channel of this love. Jesus isn't asking you to get into the lives of others to direct the traffic or control them or force yourself upon them. God has a special plan and purpose for each of His children. He is rather inviting you to join Him in this vital work of love and to trust that in His power, love really will conquer all.

We will be looking for some new leaders for a few of the Boards and will begin that search process in November. At the same time we will be drafting a church budget for next year based on the results of our stewardship program and the identified needs for various programs of the church. We all have special gifts to share.

Winter Sanctuary is a seasonal rotational homeless shelter hosted by churches in the area. The confirmation class wants to organize hosting the Winter

Sanctuary sometime in December or January. Congregation provides dinner and breakfast for up to 100 men and women as well as fellowship and space to sleep. Supervisors from Volunteers of America are present all night. Pastor Carl will lead the confirmation class in this project.

Stewardship program is underway. Ron Webb, Karen Behr and Pastor will put together stewardship material for distribution on October 30, and pledge cards for distribution on November 6.

Worship attendance has been fluctuating. Nothing seems to be wrong, but life changes, moves and a growing number of shut-ins have been contributors to low attendance. It's something to be concerned about and tackled together. So invite people you have noticed aren't at church and folks you know who don't have a church. Let them know about the special events like the Heritage Potluck and Veterans Sunday.

The Sunday morning adult classes are going well as is the Divine Drama. The Sunday School children have started practicing for the Christmas Cantata.

Al Moser and Mike Wilke got to give \$5,000 to St. John's Shelter from the Blumhardt fund. There have been lots of donations of food and clothing from the congregation for St. John's Shelter and the Elk Grove Food Bank.

The choir will no longer be processing and recessing from the back of the sanctuary because of mobility concerns, but instead from and into the choir room.

The Veterans Service on November 13 will be a really big service. Over 130 people will be honored in the new memorial banners, and the service will be a combination of the services when the WWII Service Flag was dedicated and retired.

The Fall Festival was a huge success. We made over \$1000 more than last year. Community outreach and congregational support was so important at the Fall Festival.

On-Going Projects:

Kitchen Work (Blumhardt Project): The Board has recently assisted the Blumhardt Kitchen Committee on the following efforts: roperty Board Ice Maker - DONE; the cabinet

doors were recently installed. Cook Top Hood/ Vent - DONE. The installation has been completed, including a new 8-inch vent pipe.

We especially thank Jack and Micki Fenske and Bruce Kiser for all the effort in accomplishing the above work. Micki Fenske has become the Property Board's official painter - greatly appreciated. Not sure if she hires out but she does excellent work!

Kitchen Hot Water Heater (Blumhardt Project): A contract with Mark Wilcox of Lotek Limited has been executed (\$6,800) for the water heater installation. On September 30, he obtained a Building Permit. The water heater has arrived in Sacramento and the contractor is waiting for the roofing contractor to install a new, larger roof jack and then the work will be completed.

Parking Lot Repair (Blumhardt Project): The Board has obtained bids for various options, involving different sizes of repair areas and thicknesses of asphalt concrete and aggregate base and hopes to be able to make a decision and start this urgent repair work very soon.

Plugged Storm Drains: Bruce Kiser met with a City inspector regarding the plugged storm drain inlet near the Schultz Hall addition. The inspector checked the various clean outs and determined that the problem was not caused by the City's system. On October 10, Bruce requested his plumber to inspect the problem and make an estimate for cleaning the pipe. The plumber offered to do the work for a cost "not to exceed" \$800. As the needed work is considered an emergency by the Property Board as water could back up in to the church facilities, this will be presented to Council at the next meeting.

High Soffit Repair (Bird Issue): This work on the soffit will begin soon.

AC Security Fences (Added Bar): DONE. The requested bar for the sanctuary AC unit was recently added.

Pending Projects:

Courtyard Repairs/Replacement - Since funds for this project have not been identified, this item was tabled but will be addressed very soon as it is a great concern of this board.

Additional Yard Lights – the electrician, who is familiar with the work, will be contacted to obtain an estimate for the installation of the four additional yard lights. As reported previously, the lights have been purchased.

Remaining Blumhardt Projects: The Board briefly reviewed the remaining projects, for which, the Board is responsible and will address them further as time and money allows.

- Landscape/Sprinklers \$7,500
- Gutters \$4,000
- Schultz Hall Addition \$20,000 Questionable whether sufficient funds will be available.

2012 Budget Reguests: The Board reviewed and thoroughly discussed each Budget item that is the responsibility of the Property Board. The Budget requests for 2012 created a lengthy discussion regarding the projected and anticipated needs versus the probable income level for St. Luke's. The Board considers that their requests are the minimum ("bare bones") and do not allow for any unplanned needs or unanticipated cost or fee increases.

Next "All Member" Work Day: November 12. Please remember the list of unfinished projects is on the table in the Narthex for anyone that would like to help us out and are not able to participate in the work day scheduled time. We thank Bruce Kiser for his recent work of removing the weeds along the north fence line and for Karen Kiser for her work in the old playground. Also, we thank Dorothy Haney for hours spent on various flower beds around the facility. Anything, that anyone, is able to do to improve **YOUR** church property is greatly appreciated.

At this point in time, it is most likely that I will undergo surgery to remove the prostate in midlate November, which will require approximately six weeks of recovery time. ... If all goes well I should be able to return to my duties as bishop around the beginning of the New Year....

I trust that your prayers for Debbi, for me and for our children — Alyssa, Marshall, Justin and **Meaghann, along with prayers for our synod's** ministry and leadership will be offered in the coming weeks— thank you.


