Pastoral Perspective



In conversations with folks, when the concern centers on the commandments, it soon becomes apparent that the setting in which these sacred words are so often seen is that of a courtroom. In this courtroom, folks picture themselves standing beneath the awesome authority of the Supreme Judge who is

seated in solitary splendor high above in heaven. In this courtroom, there is no one like ourselves who may sympathize with our human frailty. So folks try to somehow justify themselves or find loopholes in the law that let them off the hook.


When this is the way folks see the commandments, it is understandable they try to twist them for personal purposes rather than for what God intends. An example of this is when some very religious people came to Jesus with a question to test him and hopefully discredit him. They asked, "Is it lawful for a man to divorce his wife?" They really didn't want to know what God intended for marriage. They wanted to twist God's guidelines for their own purposes. Jesus won't play that game, then or now. He knows that, in our sinfulness, even though two people are united in holy matrimony, they can fall into such a destructive relationship that the most loving thing to do is to allow the disillusion of the relationship before the people in it are destroyed. But that was never God's intention for marriage and there is no loophole in his guidelines

that makes it okay. On that day the conversation revolved around marriage. It could have just as easily been about any of God's guidelines. The truth is, we can't justify ourselves before God by twisting His guidelines. We are much better off confessing our sinfulness and the reality that we live in a sinful world and trusting that God's relationship with us is not a courtroom relationship, but rather a courtship relationship. That will make all the difference in the world for us.

You see, the commandments are intended to be the guidelines within which the courtship between God and humanity is carried out. People in love don't try to find loopholes in the commitment they make toward each other during courtship. Certainly hurts and difficulties come up, but they are confessed and forgiveness is offered and received. We aren't perfect. God knows that. Out of His great love for us, He sent Jesus to be with us and take our sins and the sins of the whole world upon Himself so we can relate with God and one another in the loving relationship God would have with us. Trust in that relationship. Give thanks that lesus understands your weakness and hurt. You are not alone. In His love, He will work with you through whatever is going on and be with you all the way.

And in God's time, the vision John records in his Revelation will finally come to pass: "And I saw the holy city, new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband. And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, 'Behold, the dwelling place of God is with man. He will dwell with them, and they will be his people, and God himself will be their God. He will wipe away every tear from their eyes, and death shall be no more, neither shall there be mourning, nor crying, nor pain anymore, for the former things have passed away.'" (Revelation 21:2-4)

Throughout this past year I have been trying to highlight the many activities and occasions that St Luke's offers to

its members and the community. We are blessed to have a core of dedicated volunteers but need to continue to expand participation through new ideas and everyone's involvement.

Treasures are the financial commitments one makes to assist the church in meeting its financial needs for staffing, facilities, and programs. It is sometimes viewed as a difficult subject for many. We are all aware of the economic challenges of today and each individual or family has different circumstances that they must face. The church faces similar challenges to remain viable and meet the expectations and needs of its members. As a result, we develop budgets that are geared toward meeting our ministry needs based on the funds that the church members pledge or expect to contribute in the church year. At St Luke's we accept the challenge to bring before the congregation a budget that effectively balances expected needs with expected resources.

In the upcoming stewardship campaign, I hope you will seriously consider what you would like St Luke's to be and how you can assist St Luke's with your time, talent, and treasures to fulfill its mission to spread, serve, and share. See you in church!

ELCA Thankoffering atitude for

For more than 100 years, Lutheran women have been setting aside coins and small offerings every day to give thanks for blessings in the ordinary and extraordinary moments of life. At a Thankoffering service, women bring their Thankofferings together to give thanks to God in worship and fellowship. Thankofferings go in full to support the churchwide ministries of Women of the ELCA. At St. Luke's we will celebrate our annual Thankoffering Service on Sunday, November 18th. • The safe has been installed and is in use.

• There is a sign up sheet in the narthex for Altar care, Communion Servers, and Head Ushers.

• We are over budget on the flower line item, so starting in January we will be charging \$20 per bouquet to cover rising flower costs and Sundays when only one person signs up for flowers.

• Adult Sunday school started October 7th.

• God's Apps has been temporarily discontinued.

• We are getting a bicycle rack at no cost; it will be installed on the concrete near the entry to the inner courtyard next to the rose bed.

• Painting of the kitchen, Schultz Hall, and Schultz Hall bathrooms will begin November 12th. Packing up of the kitchen will take place Friday, November 2nd at 9am for anyone who can help.

• The Fall Festival was a big success. WELCA raised \$2400 (\$100 more than last year).

• Council decided to divide up the \$850 that was being held in the community concerns fund. \$500 will be sent to the Sacramento Children's Home Crisis Nursery Program to help children and families with children ages 0-5 that need emergency child care or overnight care where there are dire situations. The remaining \$350 will be kept to host a Winter Sanctuary event for homeless in the area in early 2013.

• Council approved a motion that would only allow kitchen use when an authorized person of the church is available to open, supervise, and close the kitchen after use. A continuing resolution will be written to detail the policy and procedure.

• Proposed 2013 budget will come to council next month before going to the congregation for approval at the Annual meeting on Sunday, December 9th. Stewardship Program will kick off on November 4th; it is a Lamp Lighter theme and will continue Sunday November 11th.



At the October Worship & Music Board meeting, it was pointed out how Muse that the budget for altar flowers is overrun, due to the rising cost of flowers, passed on to St. Luke's by

our florist.

With this in mind, the W&M Board has come to the decision that beginning January, 2013, the price per bouquet for altar flowers must be increased to \$20.00. It is our feeling that the bouquets are well worth the new cost.

The flowers are a beautiful addition to our sanctuary and are supplied by you, the congregation, for many different occasions; birthdays, anniversaries, memorials, thank-you's, secret sisters, and the list goes on and on.

We wish this price increase was not necessary, we pray that you will continue to order them as you have in the past for your flower needs.

A new flower calendar will be posted soon for your use in planning for next year. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact anyone on the Worship & Music Board.
