Pastoral Perspective



The Good News of Easter is that the risen Lord Jesus is with us at all times. He is with us even at the time of death to give us new life. We can be confident that we and our loved ones have life, now and for eternity. We have not been defeated or ground down by death.

On his way into the village of Nain, Jesus meets a grieving woman on her way to the cemetery. She certainly has every reason to grieve. First, her husband had died, and then her only son! What's the use, she must have wondered. Life seemed to have lost all purpose and meaning. Roll the stone against the door and write: "The end: It's all over. I've called it quits. I've tossed in the towel." But God has a way of moving stones, just as He did with that big one which blocked the door to Jesus' grave.

He replaced the woman's cries of anguish with shouts of joy. Remember that when you are sure the end has come, the burden is too big, the battle is over, the enemy has prevailed.

God acted mightily: "When the Lord saw her, his heart overflowed with compassion. 'Don't cry!' he said. Then he walked over to the coffin and touched it, and the bearers stopped. 'Young man,' he said, 'I tell you, get up.' Then the dead boy sat up and began to talk! And Jesus gave him back to his mother." (Luke 7:13-15)

The joy we can share from this event is that the mighty thing that happened was not just a single isolated revival, but a pledge and promise of things to come. The Lord Jesus showed Himself once again to be the unmistakable ray of light which announced and assured the dawn of the glad day of resurrection. Remember Jesus said of Himself, "I am the resurrection and the life." In Him, in His Easter conquest of the coffin and triumph over the tomb, the resurrection of all believers has been assured.

"Then the dead boy sat up and began to talk!" Don't you wonder what he had to say? Did he tell his eager attentive listeners all about the experience of dying and being dead? Oh, if only someone would. If only someone would take all the mystery out of death so we wouldn't be frightened by it. But all we have is the miracle of Easter, the miracle of the one who was raised eternally from the dead. In that greatest of all miracles the sting and horror of death is really removed for us. Easter is all we have. But it is enough!

The crowd's reaction to the raising of the son by Jesus was quite appropriate. With joy and thanksgiving they shouted, "God has visited his people!" They realized that in Jesus, God was active, He was there. This visit was to prove to be a redemptive and eternal visit.

The visit was redemptive because Jesus came to bear the burden of a cross to the lonely hill

of Golgotha, there to die so that God might blot out our offenses from His sight forever, henceforth to see us through the life giving eyes of Jesus. Christ visited Calvary and God no longer visits us for our sins. For three days Jesus visited a garden grave and then burst the bonds of death by His Easter rising. And now we are but temporary visitors in the tomb. For as He received, He gives us--new and immortal bodies in a new world.

The visit was also eternal. It reaches to all times and all places. Don't fret that Jesus has gone back to the Father and left us alone to suffer and die. He is right here in the Comforter, the Holy Spirit, Who makes us more than conquerors over every trial and suffering and loss. He is there in others to comfort, console and encourage. He is there every time water is poured on the head in baptism. He is there in the bread and wine of Holy Communion. He is there even at the time of death.

Let us respond with the joy and thanksgiving that comes with the knowledge that He redeems and He is here. God has and continues to visit His people and give them new life. So it was for the widow of Nain, so it is for us. Let others know this Good News is for them too.

I last wrote and much has happened at St. Luke's.

We had another successful Crab Feed due to the efforts of many folks in so many ways. Lent was a special time with soup suppers, fellowship around the table, and short plays on the events leading up to Holy Week and Easter. We celebrated Easter with a full house for worship preceded by a wonderful Easter breakfast and egg hunt for the children, in spite of the stormy night before.

So now we look forward to the time leading up to summer as a time to begin a new Bible study with Pastor, help clean up our facilities and grounds, and continue to attend our Sunday worship services. The days and months seem to go by quickly as we move from season to season.

At our Council meeting in April, we reviewed proposed opportunities for using the Crab Feed earnings to reach out and serve others as well as continuing to support the maintenance of our facilities. We allocated \$3,000 to upgrade the nursery and develop a clothing exchange program for children in the community. Another \$650 went to the Evangelism Board to develop a system to make audio copies of our worship services to primarily reach out to those who are not physically able to attend. The Crab Feed committee received \$220 to purchase needed utensils to support Crab Feed events. And finally, \$4,678 was allocated to the Property Board for use towards their list of projects. We thank everyone who made this possible through their efforts working the Crab Feed, attending and supporting this event, or for donating various items or services for the raffle.

Our financial support has been good through the first three months and we hope this will continue. Strong financial support helps us maintain our current programs and enables us to provide additional help in areas of need. Thanks to you all. See you in church! Your fellow servant in Christ,

Reading The Bible Christian Education Board:

In last month's News and Views, we mentioned the success of the Christian Education survey. Pastor is leading us through our Bible reading classes, which began with an orientation class on Sunday, April 14th. On May 5, we will begin our group study class. Group study is a conversational, group environment where people can explore and grow our faith together. It's a safe place to ask questions about faith and learn about the Bible. Here are a few highlights from the first three meetings:

Chapter One: Story

Each of our stories is a part of a bigger story – God's story

As a group, we will explore the Bible together looking for guidance so we may find our place in the story

Chapter Two: Scripture

The primary way God reveals himself to us today is through Scripture

The Bible is both historically reliable and relevant to our lives

Chapter Three: Creation

The story begins with a glorious Creator and his beautiful creation

Human beings were created to reflect Gods image and be in a relationship with him

The results of the recent survey were clear. We all have a desire to grow in our relationship with God. What exactly *is* growing? The answer is found in a New Testament book of the Bible. It is in a letter written by the apostle Paul: 2 Thessalonians 1; 3-4 "We ought always to thank God for you, brothers, and rightly so, because your faith is growing more and more, and the love every one of you has for

each other is increasing. Therefore, among God's churches we boast about your perseverance and faith in all the persecutions and trails you are enduring."

Paul is congratulating them on growing their faith. So what's the big deal about faith? Well, God wants to grow our faith, and here's why... Because faith, or trust, is the centerpiece of every great relationship. You can't have a healthy relationship with anyone without faith or trust. As trust deepens, relationships deepen and mature. God sent Jesus into the world to reestablish a relationship with mankind. For that relationship to happen there must be trust, or to use the Bible word, faith. Unlocked Church Doors



The church doors are being left opened – unlocked or locked but unlatched – too often! Needless to say, unlocked doors are inviting to unwanted, mischievous/

malicious guests and create loses for St. Luke's. It is suspected that, in the recent St. Luke's burglary (during which, sound equipment and the communion chalices were stolen), entrance was gained through an unlocked door. Other instances have occurred, in which, the damage was minor, but added chores were created. Example, this winter someone got into Schultz Hall and released the contents of a fire extinguisher – a mess to clean up but no insurance claim.

As you have no doubt seen, the Property Board has installed bright yellow notices on all the doors to remind those who are responsible for locking up to ensure the doors are latched and locked. Unfortunately, it is not uncommon to find a door locked but **unlatched**, especially during the winter months when the doors swell and do not latch without a little effort.

In addition, red "emergency exit only" signs have been installed on four exterior doors, which are seldom used. Nonetheless, these are the doors which are most often found unlocked.

The door by the Altar Guild room.
The south (Tangerine) sanctuary door.
The east Multi-Purpose room door.
The east door of the Schultz Hall addition.

Finally, Chairperson Clarence Korhonen is contacting the leader of each non-St. Luke's group that uses St. Luke's facilities and reminding each to make sure the facilities are locked when leaving.

It is the responsibility of all of us to ensure the church facilities are secure. You cooperation is appreciated. Thank you.
