Pastoral Perspective



There are different ways of considering things. One is to ask, "How can it be described?" So of a table, for example, one might ask, "What is it made of? How is it put together? How high is it?" Etc. These are all impersonal questions meant to store up

knowledge. The table is out there, detached and external from the person asking the questions. What is being looked for is an analysis of the table.

Another way of considering something is to ask, "What is its relationship with me?" So of a table, for example, one might ask, "What purpose does it serve? How does it make a difference in the way I live?" Etc. These are personal questions meant to help one understand the relationship of the table to the questioner. The table is discussed as it is related to the one considering it. The table is not out there, not looked at as external, but rather part of a larger reality of which both the table and the one considering it are parts. In this way of consideration, a complete description of the table is not the goal. The goal is a better realization of the relationship between the table and the one considering it.

As we consider the Trinity as Jesus speaks of it at the end of Matthew's Gospel, it is vital that we use the second way described above. There is no way we could fully understand or completely describe the Trinity. And yet, the Trinity is very real in relationship to us and we are able to realize that relationship as long as we consider it in the right way.

Jesus says to His disciples after His resurrection, "All authority in heaven and earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit" (Matthew 28:18-19). Here we have the Trinity named as such. There are places in Scripture where the three persons of the Trinity are talked about together, but here they are in the formula with which we are so familiar-Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Jesus doesn't consider the Trinity as a static reality to be described and analyzed, but as a vital reality to be called upon in Baptism. He says we are to baptize in the name of the God who creates and preserves us, the God who acts in history, and the God who acts in us-all acting together as One to bring us into right relationship with God.

Paul explains this right relationship we have with God through baptism in Romans 8:14-17: "For all who are led by the Spirit of God are sons of God. For you did not receive the spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you have received the Spirit of adoption as sons, by whom we cry, 'Abba! Father!' The Spirit himself bears witness with our spirit that we are children of God, and if children, then heirs—heirs of God and fellow heirs with Christ." As baptized persons, we are being led by God, the Holy Spirit. It is through our direct relationship with this Spirit that we are able to see God as our Father, the One who considers us His children and heirs. It is through our relationship with this Spirit that we can see God as the Son, the One by whose suffering and glorification it has been made possible for us to be children and heirs of God.

The Trinity, then, as considered by Jesus, is not a static concept but a vital way of realizing connection with the God who works in our lives and world as creator, savior, and guide. The claiming of this connection, the affirmation of this relationship, is the meaning of baptizing in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit. The Trinity, as Jesus shares it here, certainly cannot be seen as an absolute description of God. We cannot tell what God looks like, or describe the inner workings of the Trinity. But we can tell what God has to do with us. That's what is important for us. Rejoice in that relationship and share about it with others.
