## Pastoral Perspective



It's not surprising that the shepherds didn't need to ask for further directions from the angel about where to find the Christ child that first Christmas night. A manger (a feeding stall for animals) is someplace a mother wouldn't put her new born baby unless absolutely necessary. Animals and people lived closely together in Palestine at the time of Jesus' birth, but the manger was the place to put the hay to feed the animals, not a place to lay a baby. And yet it was exactly to this humble place that the shepherds were directed to go to see the Savior of the world.

This is really amazing. If the story of Jesus were an Horatio Alger story, a story of a poor boy who made it big, we could deal with it easily. It would show the depths from which this poor boy rocketed. It would set up a contrast for later great worldly success. But the poor setting of the manger is really the setting for not only our Savior's birth but also His ministry.

When He emerged as an adult, He came to the synagogue in His home town of Nazareth and announced: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to the captives and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed, to proclaim the

year of the Lord's favor" (Luke 4:18-19). And then He simply proclaimed that this prophecy was fulfilled in Him. He was bringing the power of the kingdom of God right to people in humbled situations.

Many couldn't understand this. Many still can't. After all, isn't religion composed of scrubbing up, dressing well, and trying to clean up your act so that God will approve of you? Isn't the kingdom of God supposed to be the crowning touch for those who are at the top of their game, rather than some moving power for those who are caught in their own sin and the sin of the world?

But Jesus' ministry is on behalf of the humble people in the midst of life's trials and challenges. While folks often wait impatiently for Him to bring His blessing to their exalted situations, He is at work with those who know they can't make it without a Savior. The song of Mary to Elizabeth when Mary wonders at God's way illustrates what Jesus' ministry is all about: "He has brought down the mighty from their thrones and exalted those of humble estate; he has filled the hungry with good things, and the rich he has sent empty away." (Luke 1:52-53) The psalmist proclaims the same message: "He will be the deliverer of the poor, a friend of those who have no one. For humble people he is within reach, he gives hope to those without rights. Their blood is precious in his eyes; he ransoms them from the house of slavery" (Psalm 72:12-14).

I love that verse, "For humble people he is within reach." That's what Jesus is all about from His birth 'til now and forever. He is within your reach as you humble yourself. Confess with me that you can't get it together or make it on your own. You need Him. He will be there with you and for you. He is used to being in humble surroundings. He is right at home there. He will bring you peace, love and hope.

## **WROUGHT IRON FENCE CONSTRUCTED**

### **Thank You, Jennifer and Phillip Connell**

As you might be aware, in recent years unwelcomed guests have caused a number of problems in the back area of the church facilities, such as unsanitary conditions, unsightly messes, and other troublesome issues. In addition, the area has experienced burglaries and vandalism. And the church's trash bin, which is in this area, is often used by others, especially to dispose of large items, leaving less space for the church's trash (or requiring a costly extra pick up).

Several years ago, we needed to eliminate the long-standing newspaper shed, as it was attracting unwelcomed guests (as many as six on one occasion).

In late 2014, after 10 reported incidents of burglaries and vandalism, the Property Board investigated, for the Council's consideration, many different means to improve the facility security, including fences, security cameras, on-site (live-in) residents, night patrols, and vegetation removal. The Board, in cooperation with the Council, has removed overgrown vegetation and re-landscaped several areas, purchased a large safe for valuables, installed guards on door latches, fastened reminders on all doors to minimize incidents of unlocked doors, and, most recently, with the encouragement and generosity of Jennifer and Phillip Connell, constructed the wrought iron fence and gate across the north driveway and vacant property. In addition, appropriate signs were mounted on the fences.

The Property Board and Council believe that the new fence and gate, together with the other added security measures, will significantly reduce, but not eliminate, the incidents of problems, especially for the back area of the church.

On behalf of St. Luke's congregation and Council,

the Property Board sincerely thanks the Connell Construction Company for their generous gift of the newly-constructed wrought iron fence and gate.

Throughout the years, the Connells have demonstrated their generosity and continuing support for St. Luke's. They initiated and continue to support the Fireworks and Crab Feed fundraisers, expanded the Sanctuary Cry Room, assisted with the Narthex remodeling project, and, as their latest effort, funded the new wrought iron fence and gate.

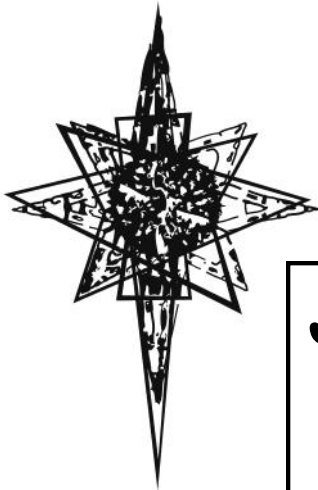
