







Pastoral Perspective



The most important thing you can do as a parent, grandparent, aunt, uncle, or one who cares for young ones in any way is to help God's children come to Him. Many times, in Scripture, we hear God's gracious invitation to come to Him. The prophet Isaiah wrote: "Listen! Whoever is thirsty,

come to the water! Whoever has no money can come, buy, and eat! Come, buy wine and milk. You don't have to pay; it's free!" (Isaiah 55:1) Jesus said: "Come to me, all who are tired from carrying heavy loads, and I will give you rest." (Matthew 11:28) In Revelation 22:17 we read: "The Spirit and the bride say, 'Come!' Let those who hear this say, 'Come!' Let those who are thirsty come! Let those who want the water of life take it as a gift."

God calls us to come to Him. That is because it is God's earnest desire that every one of His children would come to Him and know the joy of being in right relationship with Him forever. In the first pages of the Bible, after Adam and Eve had sinned and were hiding from God, God came looking for them. In searching love God "called out to the man and asked him, 'Where are you?'" (Genesis 3:9) The loving call of God reached its climax when Iesus was lifted up on the cross, "drawing all people toward him." (John 12:32)

The reason, then, that it is so important to help God's children come to Him is that it is so important to God to have them come. Iesus said: "Don't stop the children from coming to me!" (Luke 18:16) Consider, then, how you can help God's children come to Him.

First, come to God yourself in all situations. That's especially important to remember during this challenging time. To whom do you look in times of uncertainty and concern? If you want your children to come to God in faith, you need to be doing that yourself. To whom do you give thanks and praise, trusting that you will be seen through the challenges? If you want your children to come to God in thanksgiving and praise, you need to be doing that yourself. Your children are watching you carefully. If you despair and act hopeless, they pick that up. If you trust in God, even in the most challenging times, they will remember that. If you give thanks and praise to God for His blessings in all things, your children ponder that in their hearts and grow in it.

Second, help God's children develop the skills of the life of faith. One important area in this regard is prayer. You need to pray with your children in order to help them come to God. That's the best way to show your trust in God in all situations. That's the best way to show and grow in thanks and praise of God together. Pray at mealtime, at bedtime, whenever. Don't feel like these prayers

have to be profound. They simply need to be heartfelt. If you don't feel there is anything to pray about these days, please contact me because we need to talk!

Third, spend time together discussing and learning from the Bible. Talk about children's times in Web Holy Communion. Read Bible storybooks or books based on Bible. View Bible videos together and discuss them.

Fourth, help God's children come to him in service to others. Take part together in caring and sharing projects. Teach your children to give freely and naturally from what they receive as a matter of faith. Help your children feel and act on compassion for others in need. There are a lot of folks and caring organizations that need our loving sharing at this time.

Finally, realize and allow that your children are, in truth, God's children. God has a special ministry for each of His children. Your work is to help God's children come to Him so they can grow in God's plan and purpose for them. God bless you in this incredibly special ministry.

WHAT PASTOR CARL HAS BEEN UP TO (WITH A LOT OF HELP FROM MY FRIENDS!)

 Because of hard work by Holly Hoppman and Rochelle Jaeger as well as growing participation by folks in the service, most importantly Jane

Fanucci, we have been developing the weekly Sunday video worship services. My goal is to have it much like a regular Sunday service, but not longer than about 45 minutes. According to people I talk with who know about such things, folks tend to tune out after that. I have received many helpful suggestions about the service. The biggest one has been a real desire on the part of a lot of folks to have Holy Communion available each week. Although I don't have a way of knowing who all is viewing, I do know we have folks from Wisconsin to Honolulu viewing the services.

2. A Zoom video Bible study session started Tuesday morning, May 12. There are fourteen participants so far. I am very excited because folks like Marilyn Sodergren and Sylvia Kohler, who couldn't take

part otherwise, are able to be a part of the group. Let me know if you are interested in joining us.

 If response continues to be positive, I believe video worship and Bible study will be a part of congregational life for some even after we reopen. 4. Drive-Through prayer continues every Sunday thanks to Ron and Pat Webb and Ron and Cheryl Franklin who set up, direct traffic, and clean up. On Mother's Day we had forty -nine people come through. We are sharing in some important prayers. The Women's group

provided flowers for the women on Mother's Day. The Iretons provided snack bags the Sunday before that. 5. I have received a number of ideas and suggestions regarding reopening. They deal with cleaning, setting up for social distancing, how many services to have, how to have folks involved in leadership of the services, how to get folks in and out of worship, and related concerns. At the time of this writing, we don't have any guidelines from governmental agencies regarding how many people we can have gathering or when we can start gathering. So things continue on hold. I am including a statement below from the Synod regarding the situation. A tsk force is being put together to prepare for when we can reopen.

"In this very different time for our shared ministry, with each day bringing new challenges and opportunities for our work and witness. Online worship, meetings by Zoom, pastoral care offered over the phone, and baptisms, weddings and funerals that have had to be postponed are all a part of "figuring out" ministry these days.

Our advice regarding "re-opening" is the same as it was when these restrictions were enacted in March – we must adhere to all federal, state and local restrictions. These restrictions reflect our shared values of caring for the most vulnerable among us. The number of people who have been infected with COVID-





19 in this country, as well as the number of people who have died from this virus, continues to rise and people are still at risk. The advice of state authorities in California and Nevada continues to be against loosening these restrictions too soon, so that the spread of this disease will not be hastened by our impatience with social isolation. Please consult with local and state health officials before relaxing any social restrictions. It is important for us to remember there are lives at stake in these decisions."—Sierra Pacific Synod of the ELCA

FOLLOW-UP TO MAY FINANCIAL REVIEW

In the May News and Views we discussed submitting a loan application and supporting documents to F&M Bank for a loan under the Paycheck Protection Program. The submittal was made on April 17, 2020 for a loan of \$25,000. As this program has evolved there have been various changes or more definitive guidance or information on how the loan amount is calculated and what qualifies under the loan forgiveness aspect of the program. Thus, after further negotiations with the bank, the amount of the loan offered to us in late April was \$10,279. On April 30 the loan application was resubmitted along with other loan documents and on May 4 the loan amount was deposited in the St Luke checking account.

Over the next eight weeks (through June 28) we will be documenting the spending of the loan amount on payroll and benefits as well as utility expenses that fall under this program. This documentation will be the basis for applying for total loan forgiveness at the completion of the eight weeks. And it was worse this year because there were several deep stains, which required considerable labor to remove. In 2015 and 2017, the Property Board employed firms to clean the Schultz Hall carpet. The cost was about \$500 for each cleaning and the cleanings did not meet Michael's standards. This year the Board budgeted \$1,000 for cleaning the Schultz Hall carpet. Money which now can go to other needed projects or to balance this year's income and expenditures.

Michael, on behalf of the congregation, the Property Board thanks you again for your superb carpet cleaning efforts. It is much appreciated.




