Let mutual love continue. Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it.

(Hebrews 13:1-2)

Thank you! Thank you so much for welcoming me and my family so warmly and generously to St. Luke's. Your notes and gifts are too many and marvelous to list. I needed a second door for Christmas cards. I fear I've gained thirty pounds in six weeks from two potlucks and the parade of delicious goodies, many of them homemade. I am humbled by your overwhelming welcome. Tina and I cannot sufficiently express our gratitude and appreciation for your thoughtfulness.

I hope that everyone who arrives at St. Luke's, whoever they are, receives an equally warm and generous welcome. Can we lavish equal love in Christ's name on every newcomer—even if they are not an angel like I am? (By the way, "angel" means messenger. That's in my job description—not necessarily my character or personality!)

Obviously, you've got it in you. Dorothy Haney is masterful at providing nametags for all comers, and already I've been called over more than once to greet a visitor by a member of St. Luke's who welcomed them before I could. Cheerful greeters serve every Sunday. But there's a subtle danger in that: we might think greeting newcomers is a one-person job, and that one person is Someone Else. Nope. The author of Hebrews was writing to a community, not an individual. Hospitality, like mutual love, is every Christian's calling. *Do not neglect* it!

In a recent devotion, Richard Rohr wrote: In Luke's Gospel, all of Jesus' rules of ministry—his "tips for the road"—are very interpersonal. They are based on putting people in touch with people. Person-to-person is the way the gospel was originally communicated. Person-in-love-with-person, person-respecting-person, person-forgiving-person, person-touching-person, person-crying-with-person, person-hugging-person: that's where the Spirit is so beautifully present. ("Jesus' Person-to-Person Ministry," December 27, 2022)

Every person, of course, is a child of God. Every person can be an angel, a messenger of God. Martin Luther insisted on the "priesthood of all believers" because baptism makes every Christian a pastor, an ambassador for God, a bearer of Christ. Scripture, history, and daily life are full of stories of others who serve as angels and servants of God, knowingly or otherwise. Every face you see, familiar and otherwise, presents holy dignity and a divine purpose.

So let mutual love continue, and do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers ... for some have welcomed future friends and faith companions without knowing it!

Note from St. Luke's Financial Secretary

(Qualified Charitable Distribution from IRAs)

Today's tax laws include a large "standard deduction" and leave little opportunity for many of us to deduct charitable contributions including St. Luke's offerings. However, one opportunity that does remain for those making withdrawals from IRAs is to reduce your taxable income through a "Qualified Charitable Distribution", such as St. Luke's offerings.

If you are eligible, I encourage you to seek advice from your financial or tax advisor as you determine your St. Luke's offering for 2023. Below are some partial excerpts from the IRS website.

What is a qualified charitable distribution?

Generally, a qualified charitable distribution is an **otherwise taxable distribution** (*Jack's bold*) from an IRA (other than an ongoing SEP or SIMPLE IRA) owned by an individual who is age 70½ or over that is **paid directly** from the IRA to a qualified charity. See Publication 590-B, Distributions from Individual Retirement Arrangements (IRAs) for additional information.

Can a qualified charitable distribution satisfy my required minimum distribution from an IRA? Yes, your qualified charitable distributions can satisfy all or part the amount of your required minimum distribution from your IRA.

How are qualified charitable distributions reported on Form 1099-R?

Charitable distributions are reported on Form 1099-R for the calendar year the distribution is made.

How do I report a qualified charitable distribution on my income tax return?

To report a qualified charitable distribution on your Form 1040 tax return, you generally report the full amount of the charitable distribution on the line for IRA distributions. On the line for the taxable amount, enter zero if the full amount was a qualified charitable distribution. Enter "QCD" next to this line. See the Form 1040 instructions for additional information.
