Go find another church!

Please don't misunderstand. You are beloved, appreciated, wanted and needed at St. Luke's—I thank God that you part of our community of faith. I hope your presence here will bless us and you for a very long time. So what do I mean?

In the next year, I ask you to pick one Sunday (hopefully not the same one as everyone else) and forgo St. Luke's to visit and worship with another Christian congregation. What do you notice? What sticks with you about the experience? What can St. Luke's learn from these siblings in Christ, and what could they learn from us?

I ask you to do this for multiple reasons:

**Visiting another congregation helps you see your own more clearly.** I remember returning from a college trip overseas to Israel, Egypt and Greece and realizing that the country I learned the most about was the United States. Visiting other cultures reveals our own in a way that staying put never can. Worshiping somewhere else with different people, practices, art, architecture, approaches, and style will shine a fresh new light on St. Luke's, which for many of us has become too familiar to see. Spending time in another spiritual home sharpens your view of your own.

**Visiting another congregation will be uncomfortable.** This is a good thing, because being uncomfortable heightens our awareness and expands our perspective...and our compassion. Feel how awkward it is to walk into a new church; it will give you a new appreciation of those who walk into St. Luke's for the first time. I've heard many of you voice hope that our church will grow. How we receive visitors who have the courage to enter our doors for the first time is essential to making that hope come true.


**Visiting another congregation helps you see and dislodge your assumptions about church.** You likely have ideas about how church is supposed to be and operate. What are they? Can you even name them without the prompt of experiencing something different? I know that I tend to be less open minded and more opinionated (and stuck in my ways) than I tend to think I am; I'm not really as flexible as I fancy myself to be. God's church is always bigger and broader than we imagine or experience it. What if you showed up one Sunday morning to St. Luke's to find a room full of teenagers chanting medieval Latin with candles everywhere, except for the side room which is full of shopping carts, garbage bags, and backpacks? Would you thank God?

**Visiting another congregation opens a two-way street of blessing.** A different congregation might bless you with new learnings, friends, or perspectives, or maybe tripwire a joyful memory to warm your heart. You might bless them with your experience and wisdom which is fresh to them. You might be able to share what you perceive, positively and negatively, about the way they did or didn't welcome you and bless them with your encouragement, helpful critique, or both. You might also return to St. Luke's with ideas or perspective that can help the rest of us.

**Visiting another congregation is practice in the art of going.** *Go, make disciples,* Jesus said. He also said *Go on, Go and tell, Go wash, Go show, Go the extra mile, Go in peace...*you get the idea. Following Jesus is a life on the go. It is courageously moving forward into new situations and opportunities. Somehow *Go, church* got warped into "go to church," turning *church* from a dynamic people into a static destination, from our name into a mailing address. Church is a movement, not a monument. Moving our feet to new ground helps remind us of this.

I look forward to hearing from you about your experiences of church beyond the walls on Center Parkway. God's church and world and love are so much bigger than we are. Go...







- C. On an encouraging note, the number of contributors has increased. See column graph.



To supplement the Financial Secretary's report on contributions, the Finance Board provides the graph below that compares the year-to-date figures for the Budget, Incomes, and Expenses, as of the end of March 2023. As shown, the incomes are exceeding the budget (Good). The incomes without the Reserve and Fireworks supplemental funds are falling short of the total expenses. Our goal is to increase our incomes (offerings, facility usage, etc.) such that we are no longer dependent on the supplemental incomes to meet expenses.
